Could the court also produce enough witnesses to support that our life is focused on how Christians are defined in the bible, rejecting the world's philosophies, forgiving and loving with a pure heart? Would we receive a guilty verdict?

What does scripture say about confessing our belief in Christ?

Romans 10:9-10: "If you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation."

In plain words, it is to truly believe in Christ as Savior, and to confess Him as Lord of our life. Then, shouldn't such an important and glorious event in our life produce the utmost desire to share this good news with everyone we know? After all, we've been born again!

How should true belief in Christ translate into our daily life, whether at home, at work, with friends or even with the world?

Do our actions and attitudes line up with God's Word, as found in:

Gal 5:16, "Walk in the Spirit, and you shall not fulfill the lust of the flesh."

Eph 4:2: "With all lowliness and gentleness, with longsuffering, bearing with one another in love, endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."

Eph 4:32, "And be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God in Christ forgave us."

Rom 12:17, Repay no one evil for evil. Have regard for good things in the sight of all men."

Rom 12:20-21, "If your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him a drink; for in so doing you will heap coals of fire on his head. Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good."

In other words, is our daily life, our attitude with people no matter where we are, and even through the daily chores of life reflect what Christ expects from us, so as to live to shine His light to the world around us, and abide by our confession of faith?

Finally, here's what Jesus said in Luke 6:31: "And just as you want men to do to you, you also do to them likewise."

How does that reflect in our life right now?

To the accusation of being a Christian, would our answer be "Guilty as charged" no matter the penalty?

In his book, Alone with God, John MacArthur writes, "Believers have been called to salvation to bear the name Christian, and become identified as God's people."

As such, what are the attitudes that would clearly differentiate us from the world?

1John 2:15-17: "Do not love the world or the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that *is* in the world the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life is not of the Father but is of the world. And the world is passing away, and the lust of it; but he who does the will of God abides forever."

Gal 5:16-17, "I say then: Walk in the Spirit, and you shall not fulfill the lust of the flesh. For the flesh lusts against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh; and these are contrary to one another, so that you do not do the things that you wish."

Col 3:5-6: "Therefore put to death your members which are on the earth: fornication, uncleanness, passion, evil desire, and covetousness, which is idolatry. Because of these things the wrath of God is coming upon the sons of disobedience."

As born again believers in Christ, are we ready, determined and committed to live as Christ taught us, no matter the consequences? Will Christ be Lord over our lives or will it be the world?

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
